Quick Stats on Asian Populations

Here are some quick stats from the latest release of data using the 2012 American Community Survey 1-year estimates:

The Asian population is 29,132 or 4.6% of DC's population, it grew by 6% from 2011 to 2012.

Over the past 5 years the Asian population had a growth rate of 33% compared to the District's population which grew by 7.5% over the past 5 years.

The Asian Indian population grew by by 12% from 2011 to 2012 and 43% over the past 5 years.

The top ethnic groups by size in 2012 were: Asian Indian, Chinese, Filipino, Korean, and Vietnamese.
